

# **Administering Naloxone**

#### How do Ladminister naloxone?

Naloxone is administered as a nasal spray or via injection, depending on which of the following devices for which it has been prepared and with which it has been packaged.

# **Various administration options:**

## 1. Evzio auto-injector

To use Evsio:

When ready to use the product,

- 1. Pull the product from its packaging
- 2. Pull off the red safety guard, being careful to not touch the black base of the injector
- 3. Place the black end against the middle of the patient's outer thigh and press firmly, holding for five seconds

### 2. Narcan Nasal Spray

Narcan Nasal Spray is the most recent FDA approved naloxone product. Narcan is very easy to use.

To use Narcan:

- 1. Peel back the packaging to remove the device
- 2. Place and hold the tip of the nozzle in either nostril until your fingers touch the bottom of the patient's nose
- Press the plunger firmly to release the dose into the patient's nose

#### 3. Nasal atomizer (Luer-lock device)

Nasal atomizers use a pre-filled cartridge of naloxone along with a nasal atomization device. This method also requires a white cone-shaped nosepiece that does not come in the same package as the medication. It is sold separately.

To use the nasal atomizer:

- 1. Fully assemble the atomizer and capsule
- 2. Insert the white cone into the person's nostril
- 3. Give a short vigorous push on the end of capsule to spray into the nose, using one half of its contents in each nostril

# 4. Injection via syringe:

Injecting into the muscle of the upper thigh or upper arm with a syringe also is a very common way to administer naloxone. Many naloxone kits come with a syringe and a vial or a pre-filled cartridge of naloxone. The shot can be administered through clothes.
